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OVERVIEW

The Extracurricular Activities Program is essential component of a scholar's educational experience. This programming provides opportunities for the development and engagement of student interests and talents. It also provides a basis for cultural exposure, personal values, morals and ethics with the addition of learning lifetime careers and leisure activities for participation and engagement.

Participation in Extracurricular Activities carries with it responsibilities for the student scholar, parent, school staff, and the community. Extracurricular Activities offer opportunities that assist in the development of citizenship and good will. They promote self-realization, social, and emotional growth which encourages and provides valuable lessons in the designated areas of teamwork, sportsmanship, and self-discipline.

A wide variety of experiences and cultural exposure increases the learning achievement of a child. These experiences contribute to the districts effort of premier status to produce graduates prepared to assume leadership roles as students, professionals and citizens. Extracurricular activities play a key role in the development of learning life skills, emotional expressions and value system that enables students to maximum their education and empower them to become successful 21st Century scholars living in a multicultural and diverse global society.

The vision for the Cleveland Metropolitan School District's Extracurricular Program has been developed based on prior feedback from students, parents and staff. The purpose of the program is to encourage students to participate in curriculum-related recreation, and social learning, through activities that are offered on a non-discriminatory basis.

PROGRAM ADMINISTRATION

In order to effectively manage the Comprehensive Extracurricular Activities Program (CEAP), the following components were established for the 2018-2019 school year:

- *Electronic communication of all Informational Packets for Principals*
- *Monitoring of School data input*
- *Budget and Accounting*

Informational Packets for Principals

The 2018-2019 Student Activities Program Opening Day Bulletins and Informational Packets were sent to each Building Principal via email in September of 2018. The electronic communication contained information and a smart sheet link necessary to collect school and student data for CEAP field experiences in each school. As part of the recommendations from the CEAP Evaluator, Central Office Staff continues to be responsible for inputting student participation into the district's E-School Plus data base. The District uses the E-School Plus System, which will allow online data entry and greater access to student information. The Athletics and Student Activities Staff has been trained on this system. Athletic Directors and Coaches have been orientated to new forms that will contain the necessary information by which Central Office staff can document student participation. As part of their informational packet sent electronically, K-8 Schools received a Field Trip Participation smart sheet report link, which will document their activities throughout the year. Schools are being supported, as information is received, regarding the District's student activities program.

Monitoring of Schools

The monitoring of the school's participation in the Comprehensive Extracurricular Activities Program is essential in keeping the schools on-task to fulfill their commitment to the program. During the 2018-19 Principals Institute, our department presented all CEAP information to the building principals K-12. The following week they received a electronic communication from Ken Barrett our Student Activities Coordinator with all pertinent information that was presented in the meeting a week earlier and designated links for data submission via smart sheet. Principals were asked to identify a CEAP contact person for their school. Once a quarter (9 weeks) an email was sent to all the CEAP school representatives that submitted data. If no contact was provided by a school, the principal received all communications and messaging. In January of 2018, all documented or non-documented data submissions were printed and listed in a weekly CAO update report so schools and administrative leaders would know which schools were on track and which schools were off track in data submissions. This would allow greater monitoring and supervision from multiple administrative levels and layers.

Budget and Accounting

In 2016 each K-8 CMSD school was assigned a financial partner responsible for tracking and monitoring and supporting all fiscal transactions. All CEAP funding is assigned a specific budgeting line to track all CEAP transactions. Schools now have an access to receive more information on proper cost accounting and budget tracking for CEAP.

Due to no accurate CEAP data tracking since the middle of the 2015-16 academic year, 2015-16 was the last mid-year report submitted and filed. The Athletic Department has been working diligently for two years to decipher various data points requested by the formal CEAP evaluator while reaching out to various internal data and IT department and teams to secure former CEAP data for future reporting. During the 2017-18 academic year the evaluator was reviewing data reports for 2016-17 which were relatively nonexistent due to the lack of CEAP training/understanding by the interim Director and departmental staff at the time. Upon Vince Marquard's retirement no transitional training or sharing of information took place and upon my formal tenure in July, 2017 no transitional training, files or documents were provided for review or reference.

Now that we have researched, created and implemented a formal step by step process we now can create a formal mid-year review beginning with CEAP data for the 2019-2020 academic year which would be submitted mid-January 2020. The Non-traditional Extracurricular Program funds are used for field trips or in-school presentations, for grades 1st through 5th, in five domains: Related Science (includes Health and Physical activity); Performing Arts-Music and Dance; Performing Arts-Theater and Media Arts; Communications and Social Studies; and Visual Arts

All-City Recruitment Assemblies at Glenville & Garrett Morgan (September 27, 2018)

29 student performers, 13 new registrations

In light of a significant change to the delivery model for High School programming, All-City modified the beginning of year recruitment effort. Performers were featured at two (2) all school assemblies in buildings where programming is housed.

Early registrants and returning participants presented a one hour showcase of each ensemble's work to date. Building faculty and leadership and families were in attendance. In addition to those who signed up after the assemblies, several more students joined the program as a result of the events.

NON-TRADITIONAL EXTRACURRICULAR PROGRAM FOR K-8 SCHOOLS

This program is designed to establish a strong collaboration, with cultural organizations, so that extracurricular activities can be offered to all students with the goals of connecting activities to the daily curriculum and improving academic achievement. Besides offering activities that serve as culmination events conducted at the district level, and related to the activities which students engage in on a routine basis at their individual schools, throughout the school year, other activities will be offered that will provide a full, and comprehensive, extracurricular program at their school.

Schools have organized their non-traditional extracurricular activities programs, which include field experiences, sponsored building activity periods, assemblies, and artist-in-residence programs that are being implemented throughout the year. Moving forward for the 2019-2020 academic year central athletic department will control the fiscal funds for the K-5 field experiences. We are creating an internal process that will ensure accurate data regarding identified student participation, and domain determination. Between 2017 and 2018, principals were expected to send us all of their field experiences, the identified students and the domain associated with each experience before the end of April of each year. In an effort to improve this process our department working in collaboration with the Curriculum Department can now identify pre-assigned field experiences for the year for each school and apply the appropriate CEAP dollars for each field experience. The curriculum department will identify the appropriate domains for each experience based on curriculum and academic standards.

The future Mid-year report can and will reflect and identify the schools and the number of schools and students that have participated in any field experiences per CEAP requirements. For the last two years the bulk of the field experiences or presentations have been held or conducted in the last quarter of the school year.

K-8 Non-Traditional Program Summary

- The 2018-2019 Student Activities Program Opening Day Bulletins and Informational Packets were sent electronically to each Building Principal, on September 11, 2018. The packets, sent by the Commissioner of Interscholastic Athletics and Student Activities, contained information and reports necessary to conduct the Extracurricular Activities in each school. Every K-8 school received \$12.75, per student, budget allotment, based on the projected student enrollment for the 2018-19 academic year.

K-8 SCHOOL INTERSCHOLASTIC ATHLETICS FOR GRADES 7 and 8

Since the inception of the K-8 structure, during the 1999-2000 school year, schools have received programming on a limited basis. Due to the cutback in funding for the CEAP program, the district has supported the differentials and costs for the K-8 schools Interscholastic Athletics programs.

School formed committees to determine which programs would best fit the make-up of their school environment. Factors, such as available facilities for athletics, coaching personnel and ancillary costs, were taken into consideration, before each school made their choices. The ancillary cost is the average cost that schools must incur, from their School Based Management general funds accounts, to cover the yearly costs for transportation, equipment, game day staff, security, custodial overtime, awards, and equipment replacement. Costs may vary, depending on facility usage and practice schedule. Schools were asked to commit for three years, in order to stabilize costs and to schedule events. We continue to ask for a three year commitment but enrollment and participation reflects any changes from year to year.

For the Interscholastic Athletics Program, new sports seasons were established to accommodate the variation of K-8 start, and ending, times between schools:

All program staff is providing competition experiences that support the basic goals of education and expands the student's physical, and mental, capability in their school's programs. Since 2016 to current K-8 coaches attend an organizational meeting. The athletic department schedules one per season; fall, winter and spring. Upon the completion of the organizational meetings K-8 school sport tryouts begin after school.

It is the responsibility of the Interscholastic Athletics Office to schedule games, sites, and officials for all sports, as well as conduct all-star meetings, coaches' in-service meetings, and championship contests, in all sports.

K-8 School Interscholastic Athletics Program Summary

Fall Season 2018-19

- Coaches were identified, and in place, for the 65 K-8 athletic programs.
- Campus International won the soccer championship over John Gallagher. The match was played on Wednesday, October 17, 2018, at the South Athletic Complex.
- The 2018 K-8 School Girls Volleyball Championship was held on Monday, November 19, 2018, at our East Professional Center, at 4:00 p.m. 2018 K-8 School Girls Volleyball Champions were . Another back-.
- In the Fall K-8 Girls Basketball Championship, Artemus Ward defeated Campus International 32-22 to become crowned the 2018 Girls Fall Basketball Champion. The game was held in October, 2018, at our East Professional Center.

Winter Season 2018-19

- The 2018-2019 K-8 School Boys Basketball Winter Season began on Monday November 7th, 2018. The teams were divided into 4 divisions. Mound defeated George Washington Carver for the Championship.
- The 2018-19 K-8 School Girls Basketball Winter Season began in February, 2018. George Washington Carver defeated Daniel E. Morgan for the Championship which was held in April 2019 at our East Professional Center.
- The 2018-19 K-8 School Track season began March 18, 2019. There were a total of 33 girl's teams and 34 boy teams for the season. They were broken down into two divisions. The Overall Boys Champions was Charles Mooney and the Overall girl's winner was Warner Girls Leadership Academy. This was their second year in a row and only their second year of participation.
- K-8 school eligibility criteria were implemented for the 2018-2019 school year. Schools are encouraged to develop study session plans to assist students in maintaining their eligibility requirements while participating in extracurricular activities.
- Athletic Directors' and coaches meetings for the 2019-2020 academic year been set.

High School

The Athletic Directors, and coaches, have the responsibility to develop the athlete's knowledge and skills in each sport. They will instruct students in the fundamental techniques and physical training in various sports. Building permits for all facilities were processed for the athletic sport season for each school and outdoor facility.

Beginning with the 1998-99 school year, the Cleveland Senate Athletic League approved the formation of a one-league concept for football. By doing so, each school would play three independent football contests and a seven-game league schedule. Since 2018 the football schedule reflects 6 to 7 Senate games depending on a bye due to the league now hosting only 9 teams. This permits them to have 3 to 4 independent games for the season. In previous years, each Senate school played five independent games, which was a method of raising additional income to support athletic programs. To compensate for the deficit, due to the loss of three independent games, each comprehensive high school will receive \$10,000; and Jane Addams, Max Hayes and Martin Luther King, Jr. and Whitney Young receive \$6,000. Schools are reminded to use all of the funding, by May of the academic year.

High School Interscholastic Athletics Program Summary

- * The 2018-19 fall athletic program was completed, with district-wide competitions and championships, in High School Cross-Country, Senate Volleyball, City Football, Girls Tennis, Golf, Boys and Girls Basketball, Bowling, Swimming, Wrestling, Indoor and Outdoor Track, Boys Tennis, Baseball and Softball ball.
- * A total of 66 student athletes competed in the 2018 Senate Robert E. "Bump" Taylor Cross-Country Championship, which was held on Wednesday, October 10, 2018, at the Berea Metro Parks. The James F. Rhodes Rams were crowned the Senate Boys and Girls Champions for the season. This achievement gave both teams back to back championship victories two years in a row.

Senate teams participating in the City Championship were the John Marshall Layers and the Collinwood Railroaders. A special presentation honoring the 2018 Senate All-Stars was made at halftime. The Senate City Championship Football contest began on November 28, 1931, at the old Cleveland Municipal Stadium. This was the 85th playing of the Senate City Championship.
- The 2018 Senate Soccer Championship was held on Thursday, September 27, 2018, at the Collinwood Athletic Complex. James F. Rhodes defeated Lincoln West to capture the 2018 Senate Soccer Championship crown. Prior to the start of the 2018-19 season, The Athletic Department in agreement with the Lincoln West Varsity Soccer program, the varsity soccer program played an independent soccer schedule due to the superior level of play. The Junior Varsity team for Lincoln West represented Senate play for the season.

- The 2018 Senate Softball Championship was held on Thursday, May 16, 2018 at Cleveland State University. The James Ford Rhodes Lady Rams defeated the John Hay Lady Hornets. This defeat gave the Lady Rams their 6th consecutive Championship in the Senate.

On Monday, May 20th, the Boys Baseball Championship was played at League Park verses Progressive Field due to weather conditions. The James Ford Rhodes Rams were defeated by the John Marshall Lawyers.

- For the 2018-19 season, the Powerlifting champions were the John Hay Hornets or both the boys and girls championships. The Championship was held on Tuesday, May 14, 2019 at John F. Kennedy high School.
- * The new High School eligibility review protocols were implemented for the 2018-2019 school year. Building Principals, High School Athletic Directors and School Counselors with the signature of the Central Office Athletic Coordinator confirm the eligibility for each student athlete per sport. Each school athletic director and coach for Middle School and High School are encouraged to develop and implement a student athlete study table to assist students in maintaining their eligibility requirements in the Senate and extracurricular activities. Students must maintain a 2.0 grade point average, with no "F's", on their report cards.

EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

The Extracurricular Activities program is designed to provide a holistic program of activities that will help students expand, and explore, their varied areas of interest. These activities include, but are not limited to: Cheerleading, Hi-Stepping, Military Drill, Chess, High School Coed Weightlifting. Due to the Ohio High School Association Bylaws and Regulations we no longer offer Extramural (Bowling, Volleyball, Track, and Boys and Girls Basketball, for alternative high schools. By doing so it would prohibit any student attending an alternative or small school from participating in any or all of the recognized OHSAA sports.

Job postings and descriptions are prepared and distributed to all school buildings via electronic email postings from the CMSD Talent Department prior to each sport season. Sponsors and advisors are identified, and appointed, in the schools' that sponsor activities. Appointment forms, rosters and payrolls, have been processed, according to District procedures.

- Meetings were held throughout the year for all Extracurricular Activities (Cheerleader, Hi-Stepper and Military Drill, and Chess).
- The Cheerleader, Military Drill, and Hi-Stepper competitions have established a program to reward students and teams with the highest grade point average. Each school participating in the competitions will receive a Scholar Athlete Award, presented to the student, on each squad, with the highest GPA. The awards will be distributed during the half-time portion of the competitions.
- Orientation meetings for the Competitions are held during the months of January and February every year.

K-8 and High School Chess Program

The 36th Annual Student Activities Chess Program included the following K-8 and High Schools: (K-8, 11) – Adlai Stevenson, Benjamin Franklin, Clark, Euclid Park, Joseph Gallagher, Miles Park, Orchard, Patrick Henry, R. G. Jones, Wade Park and Warner Girls Leadership Academy.. High schools (4) – Glenville, John Hay Max Hayes and Mc2STEM. The highlights for this year's season included:

- In addition to achieving a perfect score for the season, Joseph Gallagher dominated the First and Second Boards for the 3rd year in a row with Championship winners. This makes a total of four years of consecutive championship wins. Askhar Pater of Joseph Gallagher won First place for the First Board, followed by Daylon Moon of Miles Park. While Sunita Magar of Joseph Gallagher won first place for the Second Board followed by Alexis Wells of Orchard.
- Rajendra Acharya of John hay High School own first place for the First Board, followed by Richard Daugherty of Max Hayes. Nicholas Vlach of Max Hayes won first place for Second Board followed by Kamal Acharya of John

Physical Examinations

The Interscholastic Athletics and Student Activities Office coordinates an annual schedule of physical examinations for K-8 and High school students involved in sports and extracurricular activities, during the fall, winter and spring seasons. The physicals were conducted by the doctors and nursing staff of Mobile Medical Services. The 2018-19 physical examination results are as follows:

1. **Summer:** July 24, 25, 30, 31; – approximately 330 students were processed.
2. **Fall:** September 5, 11, 19 and 26; 2018 – 1,248 students were processed.
3. **Winter:** October 30; November 7, 2018 – 506 students were processed.
4. **Spring:** February 26; March 6, 2019 – 432 students were processed.

A total of 2,516 students, involved in interscholastic athletics and extracurricular activities, received physicals.

Certification Classes Sponsored by the Interscholastic Athletic and Student Activities Office

A training session for CMSD staff to obtain their Adult CPR with AED and First Aid, Health and Safety for Coaches certification was held on Thursday, June 15, 2018, at the East Professional Center. This First Aid session was held in the morning and was conducted by two members of the Cleveland Clinic. The CMSD nursing staff conducted the CPR w/AED section during the afternoon session. A total of fifty-five (55) CMSD staff members attended the morning session and forty-one (41) attended the afternoon session.

The Cheerleader, Hi-Stepper and Military Drill Clinics

The Student Activities Office annually hosts cheerleader, hi-stepper and military drill clinics for K-8 and high school squads who would like to learn and improve the various technical skills needed to perfect their performances and competition routines. The cheer and hi-stepper clinics, featured top cheer and dance instructors from the Universal Cheerleader and Dance Association. The clinics were held at the East Profession Center gymnasium as well as the Lincoln-West High School gymnasium.

High School Cheerleader, Saturday, October 20, 2018, 8:30 a.m. – 2:00 p.m.; 65 students representing these high schools: Cleveland School of the Arts, Bard, East Tech, Glenville, John Adams, John F. Kennedy and John Hay

K-8 & High School Cheerleader, Saturday, November 10, 2018, 8:30 a.m. – 2:00 p.m.; 59 students representing these K-8 & high schools: John Hay, Campus International, John Marshall, John F. Kennedy and Harvey Rice

A total of 211 students participated in technique training clinics sponsored by the Student Activities Office.

High School & K-8 Cheerleader Championship, Thursday, April 11, 2019, 6:00 p.m. – 8:00 p.m.; 34 students represented the following high schools: John Hay, John Adams and Glenville, with Glenville winning the High School Cheer Championship. While there were 88 students representing these K-8 schools: Memorial, Almira, Walton, Warner GLA, Miles Park, Wade Park, Patrick Henry, Clark, Wilbur Wright and Case; Patrick Henry won the K-8 Cheer Championship.

K-8 & High School Hi-Stepper and Military Drill Championship, Thursday, March 14, 2019, 6:00 p.m. – 8:00 p.m.; 36 students representing these K-8 schools: AJ Rick off, Campus International, Harvey Rice, Patrick Henry. The high schools included Glenville, James Ford Rhodes, John F. Kennedy and John Marshall, with Glenville winning the Hi-Stepper Championship and James Ford Rhodes winning the Military Drill Championship.

The Student Activities Office, All-Star Cheerleader Leadership Academy

The All-Star Cheerleader Leadership Academy was developed to cultivate a select group of high school cheerleaders to serve as outstanding leaders and role models, in order to promote professionalism, goodwill, sportsmanship and quality cheerleading in each of the CMSD high schools. In previous years Hi-Steppers and Cheerleader's per squads were invited to send two members to participate on the All-Star cheerleader squad.

As a member of the team, All-Star Cheerleaders are required to maintain a minimum 2.5 grade point average, be of sophomore, junior or senior level status, and display exemplary qualities on their school's cheerleading or hi-stepper squad. They are exposed to specialized technical training to strengthen their cheerleader and dance skills to share with their squads, as well as to display during various District and community performances.

Cheerleaders from John Adams, John Hay, John Marshall, Glenville, Max Hayes and East Tech and hi-steppers from John Marshall and East Tech participated in the 2018-2019 program. A total of twenty two (22) All-Stars took part in the summer program, which consisted of two hour practices twice a week.
