**Last Ordinance. No. 777-2023 First Year Cleveland**

**Executive Summary**

**Background/Purpose** authorizing the Director of Public Health to enter into contract with Case Western Reserve University Mandel School of Applied Social Sciences (MSASS) for professional services necessary to continue the First Year Cleveland Program; and authorizing any agreements needed to implement, for a period of two years.

In 2023, the City of Cleveland through the Cleveland Department of Public Health established a two-party agreement with the First Year Cleveland under the authority of Case Western Reserve University's University Jack, Joseph and Morton Mandel School of Applied Social Sciences.

Since its inception in 2016, the City of Cleveland in partnership with the Cuyahoga County Office of Health and Human Services has provided funding to First Year Cleveland coordinate care for pregnant families throughout Cuyahoga County

Case Western Reserve University's School of Applied Social Science through First Year Cleveland will continue to effectively coordinate community services, lead interconnected solutions, and be uniquely sensitive to the needs of expectant mothers, fathers, caregivers, and families. As a strong "backbone" organization, FYC is the premier knowledge resource regarding interventions that yield results and will continue to define systems level advocacy and policy change and service delivery strategies to improve care and build capacity to establish interventions to address social determinants of health needs to reduce infant and maternal mortality in Cleveland and Cuyahoga County

Case Western Reserve University Jack, Joseph and Morton Mandel School of Applied Social Sciences will serve as fiscal agent for the program, provide in-kind support and services, provide expertise and assistance and work with First Year Cleveland's Steering Committee to support program operations.

Infant and maternal mortality remains high in the City of Cleveland and Cuyahoga County, particularly inner ring suburbs. Access and delays to care, social drivers of health needs and safe sleep concerns impact health outcomes of both the mother and infant health including prematurity and low birth weight, which are primary causes of the high rate of infant mortality in the region.
