



JOBS GUARANTEE POLICY

A jobs guarantee policy would provide a good job to every person who wants one. This policy solution matters because it would **dignify historically low-wage work**, **reinvigorate a local tax base**, **close the racial wealth gap**, and **restore agency back to the 105,000+ Clevelanders currently living in poverty**.


The federal government spends **\$900 billion** on SNAP, Housing Choice Vouches, TANF, Medicaid, and other social safety-net program. Even with this level of investment, nearly 50 million Americans still live in poverty or are part of the working poor. **The lack of efficacy within these programs leave cities responsible to deal with the issues of poverty without the proper resources**.

A jobs guarantee policy solution combats the **chronic illnesses**, **languishing neighborhoods**, **poor educational attainment**, **youth gun violence**, and other symptoms that cities are forced to manage.



UBE JOBS GUARANTEE MODEL

UBE's 2026 job guarantee pilot will subsidize the employment and \$50,000 salary for 100 Clevelanders at local Main Street and small businesses for 36-months







Measure over 3 years how wage subsidies reduced the symptoms of poverty and **improved the** participants' lives, the small business, and the neighborhood

A \$600k investment by Cleveland City Council will..

Today's Benefit

- **\$15 million** direct investment into the hands of Cleveland residents The City will receive benefits via payroll, income, and sales taxes
- Catalyze Leveraged Resources
 - UBE will engage with new and diverse funding partners here and across the nation to raise \$21 million to deploy the pilot over 36 months.

Budget Narrative

These funds will be used for salaries and benefits to project personnel over two-years paid via fiscal sponsor UWGC

These funds will be used to provide required equipment and technology to UBE staff members (laptops, monitor, mouse , requisite computer software, etc.)

These funds will be paid to UWGC to serve as fiscal sponsor for UBE and pilot. Fiscal agent fee is 7.5% of revenue

These funds will be used to facilitate opportunities for engagement with funding partners. Uses of resources include meetings, travel (gas, airfare, lodging, etc.)

These funds will be used to host a funder briefing. This briefing will summit several funding partners to Cleveland for the pilot.

These funds will be used to develop partnerships, supports, and MOUs with the small businesses for the pilot. UBE will contract with subject matter experts.

These funds will be used to develop partnerships, supports, and MOUs with organizations to provide supports during the pilot.

These funds will be used to contract with Economic Mobility Corporation to serve as the research and evaluation partner for the pilot.

These funds will be used to source and subsidize research technology needed for the partnering businesses and participants

These funds will be used to develop marketing and research materials to cultivate strategic partners for the development of the pilot.
