
# Goals for Expenditure of Contract Services Funding

- Provide high-quality programming for Out-of-School time in our Neighborhood Resource and Recreation Centers
- Provide employment opportunities for youth ages 14 18 and stipend – based community service opportunities for youth ages 10 – 14
- Provide reentry support to youth and young adult returning citizens

#### **Summer Employment**





### 2023 Summer Youth Employment

- Budgeted for 218 youth for summer employment
- 30 youth in the Marketing Academy
- 8 10 for Esports Youth Assistant Coaches
- Neighborhood Resource and Recreation Centers – Responsible to conduct a Storytime for younger attendees

- In partnership with CRB 12 youth identified for Leadership program with Jaucquis Simmons
- 5 Money Mentors teaching financial literacy and helping youth with direct deposit into their own personal bank accounts



#### **2022 Year-Round Youth Employment**

- 37 youth employed in Year Round program
  - 15 hours a week
  - Primary assignments: NRRCs and CPL
- 11 Youth participated in the Lifeguard Training classes




# PIOYYA Joint Efforts with Community Relations Board

- Diversion: Fresh Start Program –partnership among CRB, PIO and Y.O.U.
- Reentry: Three pronged effort among parole officers, CRB mentors and 2 specially assigned Social Support Services Specialists to provide support for youth preparing to leave facilities and reenter the community. Assistance includes advocacy, housing assistance, and job readiness.
- Youth Employment: Target 12 youth for special 5 week leadership program under the direction of Juacquis Simmons.
- Youth Support: Collaboration on SAMHSA grant. If awarded, CBR and PIO staff will jointly participate in professional development focused on trauma-informed care and will have access to other resources in service of families.
