The Cleveland Division of Fire is made up of 741 paid, full-time career firefighters located in the second largest city in the state of Ohio; situated on the southern shore of Lake Erie approximately 60 miles from the Pennsylvania border. In 2016 the Division responded to 70,356 alarms, providing 114,325 apparatus responses, including 11,475 fire responses. The Division is comprised of 23 Engines, 11 Hook and Ladders, and two Heavy Rescue Squads that provide emergency fire and rescue response and emergency medical services to the community. As outlined in NFPA 1710 (Section 5.2.4.2¿Initial Full Alarm Assignment Capability) all suppression companies operate with a minimum of four members. The Division has five Battalion Chiefs and one Assistant Chief on a 24-hour duty schedule, and a fully-staffed hazardous material team. These resources are housed in 26 fire stations. The Division also runs a full-time chartered fire training academy. Since 2003 the Division has been reduced in both personnel (23%) and daily responding companies (20%) which has taxed an already aging fleet and department. Despite the challenges currently faced by the Division the Insurance Services Office (ISO) upgraded the Cleveland Fire Department from a class three Public Protection Classification to a class two in 2017, based largely on efforts to increase training.

The Division of Fire received an annual 2018 budget from the City of Cleveland that is made up of 96% wage and benefits and just over 4% for discretionary spending on day to day supplies. The city¿s median household income (2008-2012) is \$26,550, almost half that of the median household income for the state of Ohio. The U.S. Census Bureau currently puts greater than 34% of the city¿s population below the poverty level. Cleveland¿s population continues to decline, losing 16% in the last 10 years, and the city is still struggling to rebound from the unusually high number of foreclosures due to the results of the predatory lending crisis. A recent Department of Justice consent decree has forced the city to increase spending on Police training and equipment, limiting the funds available to other city Divisions such as the Division of Fire. The City¿s current financial situation is not capable of supporting the funding of the projects that we are proposing in this application.

Cleveland¿s Police, Fire and Emergency Medical Services Divisions are working together to train members of all 3 Divisions in response to active shooter incidents. Instructors have already completed train-the-trainer classes. Implementation of the program is being delayed by lack of funds to purchase the required PPE. Receipt of the AFG funding will allow us to purchase NFPA 3000-compliant PPE for members of the Cleveland Fire Department.

PPE for Active Shooter Incidents. The Cleveland Fire Department has conducted research in preparation for deployment of teams that will be tasked with response to active shooter incidents. Personal protective equipment for

firefighters who respond to such incidents will cost approximately \$1500.00 for each member. Cleveland has five ALS engine companies that are staffed 24 hours per day by cross trained firefighter/paramedics. Each ALS engine will be paired with a crew of firefighters from a hook and ladder. The cross trained firefighter/paramedics from the ALS engines will conduct entry and patient care operations while the EMT-B members of the hook and ladder will conduct immediate patient removal after patient care is initiated. Additionally, both of Cleveland is technical rescue squads will be trained to conduct these operations. Initially we plan to train 250 Cleveland Firefighters to respond to active shooter incidents. We plan to purchase 75 sets of NFPA 3000-compliant PPE. The cost associated with purchase of this PPE is \$112,500. The benefit of purchasing this equipment is that these 250 members will be protected when they respond to active shooter events.

PPE for Active Shooter Incidents. Cleveland has experienced a number of active shooter incidents, most notably on May 9, 2003, when Biswanath Halder entered a building at Case Western Reserve University carrying a semi-automatic rifle and began shooting at the occupants. Halder killed one person and wounded two others. Hundreds of people were forced to shelter in place for seven hours before police were able to apprehend Halder. News coverage from that day shows Cleveland Firefighters entering that building to remove victims while wearing only firefighter helmets for PPE. A similar situation occurred at Success Tech Academy on October 10, 2017. Cleveland Firefighters were once again first responders at that shooting, and entered the building while wearing only firefighter helmets for PPE. With the increase in active shooter incidents and the large number of public venues in Cleveland, it is only a matter of time before such an event happens again, and Cleveland Firefighters will once again be the first responders. The effect of this grant request will be to provide Cleveland Firefighters with the proper PPE to protect them when they ultimately and inevitably respond to active shooter incidents.
